


Due to continuous heavy rainfall and warm sunshine the top layer of the soils comes loose.


Volgens zijn advocaat is Roland Z. een zachtaardige, intelligente man.







'Why do you tear me from myself?' the satyr cries as the god carves the skin from his body. It is a classic scene, mentioned in Ovid's Metamorphoses and depicted by numerous painters, such as Jusepe de Ribera in his Apollo Flaying Marsyas, 1637. In front of this image, we become witnesses to the satyr's public flaying. His crime: challenging Apollo to a musical contest. Hanging him from a tree, Apollo cuts away Marsyas' skin. As the flayed skin blends with the redness of Apollo's cape, it becomes difficult to see where skin ends and cloth begins. And skin is not all that is 'stripped': the animal-part of Marsyas' body has almost vanished from the image.













Cover

For a tipi cover, men killed the needed buffalo in the springtime. The number of hides required depended on how many were to live in the tipi, and on the available horses to transport it. Always an even number, 16 to 20 hides were needed for most tipis. People honored the buffalo that they gave their lives so people could be sheltered, clothed, and fed. It had been thus ordained in the beginning times.

When the women had finished the heavy work of tanning the hides, many women gathered on an appointed day to sew the cover, led by one who was experienced. The day started early with prayer, and as they worked with bone awls and sinew thread, each kept happy thoughts in her mind, so that all who lived in the tipi would be happy. The cover was finished within the day.

The tipi was pitched, the smoke flaps and door tightly shut, and a fire of sagebrush burned inside. The cover was smoked to a pale yellow ochre so it would not become hard after a rain. A tipi with a smoked cover was translucent and bright inside. If there were paintings on the outside, they showed through on the inside like murals.

After white hunters slaughtered the buffalo herds in the 1880s, covers—were made of canvas. The material being easier to work and lighter to transport, tipis tended to be large Page 12 design did not change.
